

Beneficial Bugs Afterschool

In October and November, 40 youth in kindergarten to 2nd grade learned all about beneficial bugs in Oasis afterschool program at PS 2 in Paterson. Students were able to learn about different types of insects, arachnids and all forms of creepy crawlies and how those invertabrates can be very helpful for people through handson lessons. Different topics in the lessons were bees, beetles and butterflies. Students were also able to find and identify bugs within the school garden. A big thank you to Miss Julia Piermatteo, Master Gardener Coordinator, for presenting about the different insect mouthparts during one of our lessons.



STEM Explorer's at the Library



Youth in 4th-8th grade were invited to discover the fun and exciting parts of STEM through the STEM Explorer's STEP Club at the Clifton Public Library Allwood Branch. (A STEP Club is a Short Term Exploratory program in which youth are invited to join a 6-8 week program about a specific topic.) For this program, each week youth focused on a different area of STEM. They have learned how to extract DNA from strawberries, how electricity flows through conductive materials, how to engineer a marble run and how to solve mysteries with math. Over 25 youth participated in lessons from October to December.

STEM Explorer's will be returning to the Clifton Public Library in January at the re-opened Main Branch!







Guardians of the Food Galaxy in Paterson

The 5th grade class at Paterson Public School 2 is learning about Food Loss and Waste through Guardians of the Food Galaxy in school program. This program merges climate change education with food waste reduction and gardening based-lessons. The goal of the program is to improve school administrations' and students' knowledge, attitudes, and behaviors towards adopting healthy and sustainable eating habits and encourage waste reduction and gardening production. This program will run from October 2025 to March 2026.





Hike For Healing

Passaic County 4-H joined the Circle of Care and Passaic County Parks and Recreation for a family friendly hike at the Highlands Preserve in Hewitt NJ on Saturday, September 6. The 2nd annual Hike for Healing highlighted the importance of mental health awareness and the strength of communities. The one mile hike was lead by Ranger Scott Campbell. Almost 200 people and many four-legged friends joined the hike!

Paws in the Park

Passaic County 4-H joined Passaic County Comissioners at a very rainy Paws in the Park this October. Over 2,000 people and their four-legged friends joined the event in at Goffle Brook Park in Hawthorne. Thanks to the 4-Hers that made their way out in the weather: Julie, Declan, Caleb and Isobel! We made a dozen dog toys out of upcycled t-shirts. These toys will be donated to dogs at the local animal shelters.



HSI Farm to Table

In October, 4-Hers from Bergen, Essex, Hudson and Passaic County came together at Bergen Community College to learn what it takes to grow their own produce, care for livestock, and they even prepared a snack using delicious local ingredients. Handson workshops were led by 4-H staff, MEVO Farms, American Dining Creations, and Montclair Community Farms. After the event, families were invited to stay for a catered lunch made from local produce.

VetVentures at Turtleback Zoo

This November, Passaic & Essex County 4-H partnered with Essex County Turtle Back Zoo to host an unforgettable Adventures in Veterinary Science Discovery Day. Fifteen youth, grades 7th -12th, joined us for a full day of behind-the-scenes look at animal health and veterinary science.

Youth explored topics like canine anthropology, animal health care, and exotic veterinary medicine. They had the opportunity to tour the Zoo's brand-new state of the art Wellness Center and took part in a zoo scavenger hunt (did you know a giraffe's heart weigh 25lbs?!). The day wrapped up with skill labs featuring owl pellet dissection and a suturing and injection demo, giving participants a true taste of what it's like to work in animal science and veterinary science.


